As the lead champion for our downtown, the Traverse City Downtown Development Authority works in partnership with the City of Traverse City and many other local and regional partners to ensure that our community remains healthy and strong.

Our work is built on 40 years of investment in transformational projects and initiatives aimed squarely at building a sense of place, promoting economic growth and supporting our businesses, residents and visitors alike. In 2022, the DDA made investments in our aging infrastructure through the reconstruction of the West Front Street bridge and adjacent roadway. Over a three-year period, DDA financing will have contributed to the rehabilitation of four additional downtown bridges within our district.

The DDA also worked with the City of Traverse City to implement a two-way traffic pilot project on several one-way downtown streets and assemble property for a third parking structure on the west end of downtown. We were also thrilled to finally demolish an obsolete bank building to create and activate a new community gathering space – Rotary Square – in the heart of our downtown.

While we've taken some great steps forward, we can't stand on these past successes alone. We must ensure that we have a strong and vibrant future. That's why in 2022 the DDA embarked on a visioning process (Moving Downtown Forward) that identified guiding principles and key areas of focus that will guide our work in the months and years ahead. That work includes taking a plan for the lower Boardman/ Ottaway River from conception to construction, along with making additional investments in stormwater, parking, mobility, housing and climate resiliency. We look forward to the implementation of the Moving Downtown Forward plan.

With so much going on in downtown Traverse City, it's hard not to be excited. We would like to thank the property owners, merchants, business owners, retailers, restauranteurs, residents and visitors for your passion and commitment to our downtown.



Without you, we could not continue to make the needed investments in our regional economic engine and ensure that we can continue to move downtown forward.

DDA Projects

Moving Downtown Forward

In December, the DDA Board of Directors adopted the Moving Downtown Forward Plan. This strategic plan was created through an extensive stakeholder and community engagement process, with input from nearly 1,300 community members across multiple public meetings and a detailed survey. The plan identifies priorities for downtown public infrastructure projects and services as well as five Guiding Principles (see right) that will serve as a framework for future DDA resource allocation and investment decisions.

The plan also includes a detailed market assessment, documentation of community interests and priorities, an examination of the DDA's operational structure and financial model, recommendations for future governance and financing tools and actions the DDA will take in the coming months and years.

Boardman/Ottaway Downtown Riverwalk


In the fall, the DDA completed a conceptual design for a Downtown Riverwalk along the Boardman/Ottaway River, between Union Street and Park Street. The conceptual design was created through a robust stakeholder and community engagement process, including two day-long public open-house events along the river, a detailed survey and key stakeholder meetings with downtown business and property owners.

The conceptual design illustrates significant physical and placemaking amenities along the north and south edge of the river (as well as two new pedestrian bridges), allowing for greater pedestrian mobility and access along the river, improved storm water management and the preservation and enhancement of natural features. The design also establishes a physical framework for new year-round programming opportunities and future pedestrian/placemaking connections with the adjacent businesses.

A riverwalk along this stretch of the river was one of the top priorities listed in the Unified Plan for the Lower Boardman/Ottaway River (adopted in 2021) and represents the community's long-held desire to "turn and embrace" the river. Given the location and potential scope of the design, the riverwalk has the potential to be a truly transformational project for downtown.

Rotary Square

A longtime dream of creating a civic square in downtown took one huge step toward reality. In August, the DDA demolished a bank building on a lot at the corner of State and Union streets (which the DDA purchased in 2021) and then re-seeded and added irrigation, bringing what's now called Rotary Square to life!

In October, nearly 1,000 people attended the first public event at Rotary Square, a tailgate for the Michigan/Michigan State football game. In December, Santa's House (with additional holiday lighting) was located at the square.

We look forward to hosting additional events, including a concert series with the Traverse Symphony Orchestra throughout the summer.







Two-Way Pilot

In 2021, the DDA initiated a process to investigate and study downtown circulation, as well as the feasibility of converting one-way streets in downtown to two-way operation. The study came on the heels of a successful two-way conversion pilot project on a portion of State Street during the summer of 2020, as well as a review of similar circulation conversion projects in downtowns through the country.

Based on the results of the study, the DDA (in cooperation with the city) converted State Street, Pine Street and Boardman Avenue to two-way traffic under a two-year pilot project beginning in November. The purpose of the pilot project is to continue DDA efforts to reinforce a "to" mobility strategy for downtown (versus a "through" strategy), slow traffic on State Street, support pedestrian movement, encourage better vehicular circulation through a more connected grid system of streets, encourage private investment and increase the vitality of commercial areas throughout downtown.

Mobility Action Plan

In the fall, the DDA and city kicked off a process to develop a Mobility Action Plan for the entire city. Stemming from the Reimagine East Front Street initiative, the Mobility Action Plan will identify opportunities to improve the multi-modal transportation network by evaluating how pedestrians, bicycles, cars and trucks move throughout the city, then developing a plan to make it better.

Parking

Parking Services implemented a non-premium rate in an effort to redistribute permit holders. The reduced cost of monthly permits encourages walking from nearby facilities while reducing traffic and circulation. It also benefits employees by offering reduced rate permits and encourages changes in behavior to park in structures as we continue efforts to reduce surface parking lots for infill development.

Grants

The DDA secured the following grants for downtown. The first three came from the Michigan Economic Development Corporation; the last was from the USDA.

\$1 Million for the Boardman/Ottaway Riverfront **\$400,000** for Golden Shoes façade improvement **\$25,000** for Northern Blooms Montessori **\$80,000** for a planned Retail Incubator





Beautifully renovated **Golden Shoes** removed its boxy white cover and reclaimed its historic brick façade. The Golden family also developed lofts above the store.

\$27.5 MILLION IN NEW INVESTMENTS IN 2022

Socks Construction completed a new mixed used building on State Street that now serves as the proud home of **Playa Bowls** and **Cousin Jenny's Cornish Pasties.**

Public Capital Improvements

The DDA contributed TIF funds to the rehabilitation of the West Front Street bridge. The project included bridge removal and replacement as well as an extension of a watermain. The new bridge also included wider sidewalks and new streetscaping that included new pedestrian scale lighting and new trees.

Among other projects, TIF funds were also used for a much-needed resurfacing of East Front Street between Railroad Street and Boardman Avenue.





In the fall, the DDA worked with Corbin Design and Valley Hill Sign to update and install several new signs to the downtown wayfinding sign system. This heavily used system lets visitors find what they're looking for quickly and easily. Work included:

- Replacement of eight damaged wayfinding signs
- Updating and replacement of 13 wayfinding kiosk panels
- Addition of 12 new specialty wayfinding signs (for side streets).

Downtown Planters

In early summer, over 700 plants were planted in 48 planter boxes (including 21 new planter boxes) throughout downtown. The DDA partners with the Michigan State University Extension (MSUE) Master Gardner Program to plan, purchase, plant and care for each planter box throughout the summer. MSUE also uses the planter boxes to monitor and track pollinators downtown. In addition, the DDA partners with the YouthWork program of Child and Family Services of Northwestern Michigan to help water the planter boxes throughout the summer.

YouthWork is a unique program of Child and Family Services designed to develop young people and their communities by completing critical projects for nonprofits and government agencies. This crew worked hard to keep our streets and sidewalks tidy (and our planters watered) all summer long!

Volunteers from the **MSU Extension Master Gardener** program worked diligently in the spring to help us plant hundreds of plants in dozens of planters throughout the downtown district.
