

#### Petrokovitz Exhibit

I was able to connect with Mr. Petrokovitz and he should be removing the vandalized sculpture within the next two weeks. The Arts Commission will fund the repainting of the sculpture.

#### **Anishinaabek & Perry Hannah Plaques**

I have contacted Emily Modrall, who is working on her own project related to signage and the Anishinaabek language. I am hoping she can help us get our plaque translated, or provide the appropriate contact. I have attached the proposed modifications and want to get final approval on the changes from the Arts Commission.

#### **Banner Project**

I am still working with Britten Banner to replace the current banners and add the banner artwork from Justin Shull. I hope that we will be ready to install banners by early June.

#### **Two-Way Bump-Out Project**

The paint has arrived. We need to schedule a day to paint the street. I'm hoping everyone will bring their calendars, so we can schedule this activity.

#### **Paint-it-Forward Grant Program**

We plan to roll out the program for the next fiscal year, starting on July 1st.

#### **Perry Hannah Suggested Modifications**

#### **Existing Plaque**

In July of 1851, at just 26 years of age, Perry Hannah, President of Chicago's Hannah, Lay & Company, sailed into the Grand Traverse Bay wilderness, for the very first time in search of timber to support his company's lumber needs during America's gilded age.

For the sum of \$4,500, Mr. Hannah purchased slightly more than 200 acres of heavily forested bay shore property that straddled what is now known as the Boardman river River and extended to Boardman lake Lake. This was the raw-beginnings of a future great change.

Mr. Hannah came for the timber and remained for the rest of his life, serving as the city's first mayor and one term in the state legislature while constantly working to adjust altering the local economy to keep it alive. For more than 50 years he was respected by his employees and business associates[?], and their lives and building—helping to build a great community while andleaving extraordinary gifts of architecture and public land for the enjoyment of future generations. Virtually everything we see, touch, feel and sense about Traverse City today can be traced directly back to founding father Perry Hannah. Much of Traverse City's current form can be traced to Perry Hannah's vision. His most readily recognized gift is his retirement home, located just a few steps west at 305 west sixth street West Sixth Street, a valued memory asset that speaks clearly to his legacy.

#### **New Plaque**

The land Hannah claimed for the construction of Traverse City had long been part of Kitchi Wiikwedong, the homeland of Odawa and Ojibway Anishinaabek. Made to conform to new definitions of property ownership and rights, the local Anishinaabek were increasingly forced with each federal treaty to change or abandon traditional ways of life and sacred practices and places, including those along the Ottaway (later Boardman) River and throughout the area that quickly became Traverse City. Nonetheless, according to English-language histories, the Anishinaabek were accommodating and generous, contributing to the success and prosperity of the very industries, town, and people, including Perry Hannah himself, so radically altering their lives and home.

#### **Eighth Street Art Corridor**

Last month, we received a proposal from TART Trails regarding interest in collaborating with the Arts Commission to create the "Eighth Street Creative District". The proposal comes on the heels of the now completed Boardman Lake Loop and the positive community feedback from the art installations along the trail. The proposal (see attachment) proposes to make the Eighth Street district a priority to continue placemaking through public art.

I'd like to discuss the possibility and/or interest of this proposed initiative at our meeting. To that end, I have attached the feasibility worksheet from our Strategic Planning effort to help you (and us) evaluate this proposed initiative. Please be sure to fill out the worksheet prior to the meeting.

#### **MACC - Mural Festival**

I submitted a \$20,000 grant request to the Michigan Arts and Culture Counsel on behalf of the Arts Commission for the Mural Festival.

#### **Arts Commission Budget**

The Arts Commission budget was approved by the City Commission at their June 5<sup>th</sup> meeting (see the first attachment). As you recall, our proposed budget included \$15,000 from the Downtown Development Authority, \$30,000 which has traditionally been the Art Commissions allocation and \$15,000 from our fund balance. The proposed \$15,000 from our fund balance will need to come in the form of a budget amendment – perhaps once we receive word about the MACC grant. I have attached our proposed budget spreadsheet for reference.

#### TART Trail Extension – Placement of Art Features

As you recall, at our last meeting, Commissioner Early and I noted that design and engineering for the TART Trail extension was at 60% completion. We also discussed the need to identify preferred locations for art along the new trail. I'd like to identify those preferred locations and other possible art opportunities at our meeting.

I have included the "work plan activities" spread-sheet from our Strategic Planning Process as a reminder of the tasks that we are work to implement moving forward. I'd like to begin to discuss item #7 under Governance and Oversight "prioritize, schedule, and sequence a five-year rolling list of capital projects".

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The 8th Street Creative District project aims to contribute to the vitality of the Grand Traverse region through artful placemaking opportunities that build on the community's cultural resources. The designation of a Creative District will elevate community values, stimulate community dialogue between people of all ages and abilities, inspire the mind and senses by creating an unexpected aesthetic experience, and enliven the appearance and appeal of this well-traveled community. People of all ages will gather as they enjoy this creative district, the businesses and establishments among it, and their contribution to the rich texture of the fabric that is the story of our time, our place, and our lives.

#### **PROJECT PARTNERS**

City of Traverse City Commongrounds North Boardman Lake District TART Trails, Inc. Traverse City Arts Commission

#### **ORGANIZATIONAL OVERVIEW**

TART Trails and the Traverse City Arts Commission, in cooperation with the City of Traverse City, strategically place art installations around the Boardman Lake Loop, both within and outside of the City limits. It is a priority of both the Traverse City Arts Commission and TART Trails to connect outdoor recreation with the arts, while supporting Michigan-based artists. There are currently seven art installations on view between Oryana 10th Street and Medalie Park.

Following the opening of the Boardman Lake Loop and the overwhelmingly positive community feedback from the art installations facilitated by TART Trails and the Traverse City Arts Commission, project partners have identified the 8th Street district as a priority to continue placemaking through public art. The results of the North Boardman Lake District Healthy 8th Street study further identify the need for a creative district to aid in placemaking, pedestrian accessibility, and visual signals of community goals and values.

#### **PROJECT TIMELINE**

March - December 2023: Project Planning, Fundraising efforts Spring 2023: Franklin Street Pilot Project Summer 2023: Stakeholder engagement Fall 2023: Cairn installation January 2024: Artist contracts finalized Spring 2024 - Spring 2025: Installations continue Summer 2025: Creative District celebration

Project partners will plan continued programming to highlight art installations and which support local and regional creatives. As well, continued community engagement and stakeholder surveys will take place to assess the project and future opportunities.

#### **TENTATIVELY PLANNED DELIVERABLES**

A final list of deliverables will be determined following additional stakeholder engagement. Based on current articles of engagement, a list below is a tentative proposed summary of installations.

- Sculptural elements marking the entrance to the 8th Street district including on 8th Street at Lake Avenue, 8th Street and Woodmere, and the confluence of Franklin Street and the Boardman Lake Loop
- Cairn Sculpture at Railroad and 8th Street
- Four mural installations, locations TBD
- Art installations that aid in ease of multi-modal transportation, locations TBD
  - o Franklin Street Pilot Project Summer 2023
- Sculptural bike racks placed incrementally along the 8th Street cycle track


